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Dear Parents and Carers,

Robins and Treecreepers

Last week the Reception children had a workshop entitled 'Minibeasts in the Compost Bin' with Alex Mack who works for Devon Waste Education Team. The children learnt what happens to their waste and the key message 'Reduce, Re-use, Recycle'. They found out what goes in the compost bin and which minibeasts help to break down the waste to make new soil. They had great fun pretending to be minibeasts and learnt a new song. Then they learnt how the compost can be used to grow plants, including fruit and vegetables for us to eat. Thank you so much Alex for this fun and memorable workshop.

School start and finish times

Just to clarify all children should be in school by 9am at the latest. We open the gates at 8:45 to allow for a decent window, but gates will now be shut at 9am. 9am is when lessons start so it is crucial your child is on time. At the other end of the day all children should be collected at 3:15, we try to bring the children out between 3:05 and 3:15 to allow for a window to avoid crowding but the gates will be closed at 3:20pm. Any late children will need to come to the front of the school and will be registered as late for arrival or for collection at the end of the day. (PS – I will also mention this to the teachers who sometimes send children out a bit late!)

Parent consultations

We always have a great take up for parent consultations so we hope you all managed to make an appointment. If you didn't and haven't contacted us, then staff will be calling to catch up as it is important that parents and school work as a team around their child.

Recently in the school council (which involves every single child in school) we have been looking at the issues around litter, recycling and committing to doing our bit for the planet. You can help the children to make this commitment by supporting and facilitating the things they decided to try to do:

Most popular choice – use re-usable or paper instead of clingfilm for snacks and lunches

2nd place – have a re-useable drinks bottle and label it so it doesn't get lost

3rd place – pack my own packed lunch so there isn't any waste

Children also suggested other ways to show commitment to looking after our planet and following some of these suggestions we are buying more bins for the playground including a general recycling bin and a food waste bin.

We are also buying a composter for the food waste from playtimes. The children want to set up litter picking systems and they will discuss this next meeting. We are also buying better bins for the classrooms for children to actively recycle.

Jumpers and plastic pots

In the same vein as above, we have countless school jumpers with no names on that have been lost. With 325 children in a school all wearing the same colour jumper there is no way children can identify their own jumpers without a name in them. PLEASE LABEL JUMPERS TONIGHT!! Also again, we have countless plastic lunch/snack containers with no names on... Let's not give all this to landfill!

NSPCC's Speak out. Stay safe. online programme

I am pleased to tell you that this term we will be participating in the NSPCC's Speak out. Stay safe. online programme. This consists of an online assembly and supporting classroom based activities. Speak out. Stay safe. is a safeguarding programme available to all primary schools in the UK and Channel Islands. It aims to help children understand abuse in all its forms and to recognise the signs of abuse in a child friendly way. Children are taught to speak out if they are worried, either to a trusted adult or Childline.

In the online assembly, the Speak out. Stay safe. messages are delivered in a fun and interactive way with the help of their mascot Buddy as well as special guest appearances from Ant and Dec.

We have studied the content of the materials and are extremely confident that they are appropriate for primary-school-aged children. By the end of the programme, we're convinced children will feel empowered – knowing how they can speak out and stay safe.
